MONTHLY SUMMARY

The Munro Global Growth Fund returned 1.65% for the month of September, comprising a return of 1.41% from equities and 0.24% from currency. The MSCI AC World Index (AUD) meanwhile returned 3.04% for the month (2.10% from equities and 0.94% from currency).

It was a positive month for global equity markets with the US S&P 500 up 1.9%, the European Stoxx 600 added 3.9%, the Japanese Topix rose 4.2% and the Hong Kong Hang Seng declined 1.2%. Major events in focus for the month included the re-emergence of US tax reforms with the announcement of proposed corporate and individual tax cuts. Germany held elections, which should see Merkel remain in power as she looks to form a coalition government.

On a stock-specific basis, positive performance for the Fund was driven by semiconductor memory plays in Micron, ASML and Applied Materials (see page 2) and US RV brand owner Thor Industries. On the negative side, there was a short-squeeze on British apparel company Next on the back of better than expected results. Robotic Process Automation company Blue Prism gave back some of its gains, and US credit bureau Equifax declined after suffering a data breach (see page 2). On currencies, the Fund remains predominately hedged and given the AUD depreciated during the month this resulted in 24bps gain from FX. By comparison, the fully unhedged index gained 94bps from currencies.

MONTHLY OUTLOOK

Moving into the last quarter of the calendar year, we remain positive on equity markets. Economic data coming from the major global economies continues to be strong, with PMIs well above 50 in most regions. This is contributing to improving earnings growth for listed companies, not just in the upcoming quarter, but also well into 2018. Elsewhere US tax reform is back on the agenda, which would be a major fillip for markets in the last quarter and beyond. Whilst not in our base case thinking, the tax plan contains a promise for offshore cash repatriation and 100% deduction of capex. Should the tax reform be passed through Congress, follow-on consequences would include increased M&A activity, increased corporate leverage and a higher USD, along with the obvious increase in EPS for US corporate tax payers. The Eurozone looks reasonably well placed, with the announcement of domestic reforms by French President Macron. We will be watching Merkel's ability to form a coalition and the likelihood of further Eurozone integration. The net exposure of the Fund has been increasing as the level of conviction in certain 'Areas of Interest', such as 'Car of the Future' and 'Intelligent Industry' rises, while we are likely to bank some profits in our higher multiple technology names in the months ahead. The key risk to equity markets in the short term is higher interest rates. Central banks are currently happy to let growth and inflation improve without raising rates too aggressively, and we remain watchful for any change in messaging over the months ahead.

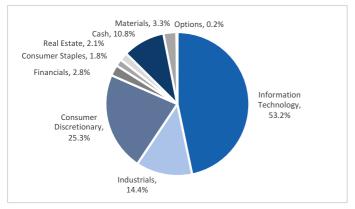

NOTABLE STOCK MOVES

MICRON, APPLIED MATERIALS and ASML (LONG, +135bps)

Micron, (USA, Market Cap \$45bn), Applied Materials (USA, Market Cap \$55bn) and ASML (Netherlands, Market Cap Eur62bn) are not names that most would be familiar with, but they are all key players in the production of memory semiconductors, with memory being one of the key building blocks of all computational processes. We see the memory market as now in structural growth as connected devices create an explosion of data, which all needs to be rapidly processed to drive artificial intelligence (AI) outcomes.

Consequently, memory has gone from a highly cyclical component in smartphones and PC's to a key building block in cars, industrial facilities and hyper scale data centres. These new applications provide strong secular tailwinds for these key facilitators, which is not currently reflected in their valuations, with Micron and Applied Materials currently trading well below the market multiple. September was a good month for all three names as Micron's Q2 results and the Applied Materials analyst day served to highlight these rapidly changing market dynamics.

EQUIFAX & TRANSUNION (LONG, -50bps)

The key detractors in September were credit reporting agencies Equifax (USA, Market Cap \$13bn) and TransUnion (USA, Market Cap \$9bn). As readers may be aware, Equifax suffered a massive cyber security breach impacting up to 143 million US consumers, whose personal details including names, addresses, social security numbers, drivers' licenses details have been stolen. In short, our initial positive views on Equifax and the other credit reporting agencies was based on their unique and proprietary data sets that have been pivotal to enabling mortgage, credit card and auto financing for many years. We clearly did not expect them to then lose that data to cybercriminals. Unfortunately, if your only role in the world is to collect data; then losing that data is an instant sackable offence for many of their consumers and also for us as an investor.

Our liquidity meant we sold the stock on the day the news broke, with the stock down approximately 13%. Subsequently, Equifax fell a total of 35% in the week following the news. Fearing an industry wide backlash, we also sold our TransUnion position which is the 2nd major credit bureau in the US with both positions contributing to negative monthly performance. Looking ahead we still like the space and the dynamics of the industry, but fear a recalibration of the regulatory goal posts is ahead of us and ultimately we are better served looking elsewhere for earnings growth in the months ahead.
